Artist Statement

Threadwinners is the moniker for the crochet collaborative comprised of Liz Flynn and Alyssa Arney. Their work aims to subvert the patriarchy and status quo through the vehicle of crochet, often with a disarmingly whimsical and lowbrow aesthetic. Their most recent work is a study on the use of yarn and crochet in non-traditional forms, such as functional furniture and large-scale soft sculpture installations. Major undercurrents of their work include the exploration of the body as landscape, affluenza, and the constant overwhelming sensory overload present in modern society. Threadwinners reveals and pokes at topics that American culture often chooses to avoid, such as death, the negative effects of capitalism, and our psychological relationship(s) with food and consumption.

Threadwinners began their collaborative art practice in 2016 and are currently based in Orange County. Flynn has an Art History BA from University of California, Riverside. Arney has a Printmaking BFA from the John Herron School of Art and Design-IUPUI.
